






Post Primary Podcasting Callout

Creative Classroom Ideas

Drop Everything and ...

...sing, act, play, read out loud (take turns!)

Helps if you have previously worked on a song together or a play or have read a novel together.

Class discussions on Creativity

Moderated by either the teacher or a local artist. Lead off with open questions like;

- What is Art?
- What is Creativity?
- Are you Creative?
- Is Creativity important?

Use Concept Mapping to record their views and opinions.

Creative Classroom Ideas

Concept Mapping

Collaborative Concept Mapping is a great way for students to step away from their individual perspectives. Groups can do this to review previous work, or it can help them map ideas for projects and assignments. You can cover classroom walls with sticky notes and chart paper or photos. Like an incident room in a police station.

Count to 10/20/30

Students count up to 10 Or 20 or 30, one at a time with eyes closed. If two or more speak at the same time – they have to start again.

Quescussion

A standard class discussion but only questions are allowed (students call "Statement!" if someone slips up). Topics could be climate change, homework, politics etc.

Creative Classroom Ideas

Think-Pair-Share (TPD)

Teacher poses a question (e.g. Is Art necessary?), students first THINK to themselves prior to being instructed to discuss their response with a person sitting near them (PAIR). Finally, the groups SHARE out what they discussed with their partner to the entire class and discussion continues.

Think-Pair-RePair

In this twist on think-pair-share, pose an open-ended question to your class and ask students to come up with their best answer. Next, pair students up and get them to agree on a response. Get two pairs together, and the foursome needs to do the same thing. Continue until half the group goes head-to-head with the other half.



Creative Classroom Ideas

LEGO

Get as much Lego (or Duplo) as you can, from charity shops, parents etc. Preferably generic Lego and not a box that makes a specific thing like a spaceship. Put the class in groups, get them to respond to a theme of your choosing by creating a Lego Sculpture. When finished each group tours the other groups work, then place all the works on table/pedestals in the corridor for the whole school to enjoy. Place the group's written descriptions on cards alongside their sculpture if they want to, but it's not necessary!



Field Trips

Take the class on a field trip to a gallery or museum or even a local landmark. Ask them to take notes on how they feel about what they see. When back in the classroom ask them to recreate what they saw but with improvements. Can be drawn, written or even sung.

Invent a New Game

Class split into three or four groups. Each group must invent a new game that can be played in the classroom. They must work out the rules, rewards and penalties of forfeits. How does one win? They then teach the game to each other and get them to play it.

Materials: balls, paper, markers, string, chalk (if outside), bats, netting etc.

Build a tower from scratch

In groups, students must look for anything they can find to build a tower from scratch. They will have 10 minutes to build the tallest tower possible. The group with the tallest, most stable tower wins!

Materials: Blocks, cards, pencils, empty boxes, and anything that students can use to build the tower.

Blind artist activity (can be related to class concepts or be random)

Pair students & place them in a position back-to-back. One will hold a picture & describe what the picture is, whereas the other student will have to draw an image according to the description. The picture and description can be related to a class concept to be used as a study tool or be completely random and just be used as a fun way for students to express their artistic side.

Materials: Paper, pencil, paint, markers, etc.



Create an advertisement

With a group, students will create an advertisement for a product or service idea that they have been working on or build off an existing brand! It could be anything from a TV advert, to a newspaper ad, or a social media campaign.

Materials: Recording devices, editing devices, design platforms, computer.

Make a Documentary

Students will create a documentary about the school or local community using iPad/tablet/phone cameras. Assign roles and jobs to each student e.g. writers, camera operator, director, presenters etc.







Gallery

During Creative February have each class design a mural or a collage based on a given theme. Allocate a space within the school or the Community where you can hold an exhibition of the works. Invite parents, general public, local artists etc. to the exhibition. Perhaps ask a local well-known person to open the show!

Mask Making

Our emotions are not always easy to identify, acknowledge or accept because we might have a fixed idea regarding what a certain experience is or means. Mask-making can help free us from the mental and emotional clutter of self-judgment, allowing us to see what is at the heart of our perception – and whether or not that perception is accurate or serving us well. It's a superb activity for young people who may have difficulty interacting with others.

Premade plastic face mask forms can be found at local or online craft shops.


A dinner-size paper plate (a great children's option) or a brown paper grocery bag can also be used to make a mask by cutting out holes for the eyes and mouth.

Ideas to explore: Create your own Superhero, favourite animal, Space Alien...



Percussion

Percussion Workshops are always very popular in schools. From simple bells and drums to group glockenspiel to body percussion and movement. There are many practitioners who will design a course specifically for your class or even whole school.



Arts Festival

Many schools in the past have hosted Arts Weeks or an Arts Day during Creative February. This affords the students to show off the creative work they have been engaged in through; concerts, exhibitions, short sketches, readings etc. It's also a good opportunity to engage artists to deliver workshops or demonstrations of their art form. You can invite people from outside the school to view and engage with the work. It has now become an annual staple on many school's calendars.
